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Chapter 16

The '20s

2023

Legendary Leadville, Colorado.

Did you also know that on August 19, 1884, 140 years ago to the day as the start of the 2023 edition of the Leadville Trail 100 Mile Running race, John H. “Doc” Holiday’s last gunfight took place at Mannie Hyman's Saloon in downtown Leadville?

Leadville, home of the famous Leadville Trail 100 Mile Running Race started by Jim Butera 40 years ago too...

Ahh, the vestiges of time hung like a cloud in the rarified air above this famous mining town as the 40th anniversary running of the “*Race Across the Sky*” began with a shotgun blast echoed amongst the gathered throng of 815 runners at precisely 4 am under a cloudless sky.

With an audible whoosh, the assembled warriors took off down 6th street into the darkness and foreboding Rocky Mountain trails that lie ahead of them.

815 runners? Oh my.

Compared with last year, that is 97 more runners allowed into the race this year than in 2022.

It seems Lifetime Fitness is slowly increasing the entry field again, year after year, much to the chagrin of runners in the race.

After the debacle that occurred with a huge field of runners in 2013, when 1,200 runners were allowed to begin the race, increasing race size will only have a direct negative impact on already crowded trails.

May Queen Aid Station (Cutoff 3:45) 12.6 miles

First to arrive in 1:38:52 was JP Giblin (Boulder), setting a blistering pace. JP was second place finisher in 2022 so he was well aware of his pace (7:51 min/mile).

Following JP was Reid Burrows 1:38:54 (NB, Canada), Spyridon Logothetis 1:39:11 (Greece), Matthew Vira 1:40:22 (Colorado) who ran the 2022 LT100 in 20:13:21 and finished in 14th place last year.

Fifth place was occupied by James O’Sullivan 1:44:56 (Colorado), followed by the legend and previous champion Rob Krar 1:45:26 (Arizona).

Running in 9th place was marvelous Marvin Sandoval (1:45:49). Further back was Christian Finkbeiner in 2:11:04 (Christian is Bill Finkbeiner’s son – Bill has the most Leadville Trail 100 finishes at 30!)

For the women, flying through May Queen in the lead was Devon Yanko 1:48:18 (Colorado) and 16th overall (8:36 min/mile).

Second among the women was Jacquie Mannhard 1:48:22 (Boulder) and 18th overall, followed by Kate LeVasseur 1:50:24 (Colorado) 31st, Colleen Noonan 1:55:37 (Colorado) 49th, Lucie Hanes 1:59:10 (Colorado) 66th, Melissa Surman 1:59:30 (Ohio) 69th, Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 1:59:42 (Colorado) 72nd and our friend Sarah West Hoover at a fast pace of 2:30 elapsed time.

Marge Hickman, co-author of this book, oldest entry in the race at age 73 and previous Leadville Trail 100 Mile Champion in 1985 came through May Queen in a very respectable 2:55:56. Marge was in 776th place overall and 166 among women, 1st place in her age group (70+) and running at an 13:58 min/mile pace.

Also, Rodrigo Jimenez, *The Dream Chaser*, started at 6:30am. Rodrigo raises money for charity, based on how many runners he passes during the race. What a great challenge!

A few statistics for those inclined:

- 74 runners through May Queen under 2 hours
- 472 runners through May Queen under 2.5 hours
- 788 runners through May Queen under 3 hours
- 815 runners through May Queen under 3:30 and under the 3:45 hour cutoff
- Last into May Queen was Leslie Singleton, TX in 3:24:44 (age F 61)
- All 815 starters made it to May Queen

Outward Bound 23.5 miles (6 Hour Cutoff); 764 runners left in race

Still in first place was JP Giblin with a time of 3:15:16. Second place was Spyridon Logothetis 3:20:04, followed by Isaac Frank 3:22:44, Rob Krar 3:23:02 and Corey Kallembach 3:26:22.

Further back was Marvin Sandoval running 3:38:22 and 26th overall.

The women's race was just as close at Outward Bound with Devon Yanko still in first place for the women in a time of 3:31:45, good for 15th place overall. Second place runner was Jacquie Mannhard in 3:37:40 23rd, followed by Kate LeVasseur 3:51:00 45th and Colleen Noonan 3:52:32 47th with Lucie Hanes 3:52:47 48th place overall, rounding out the top five women runners and in sixth place for the women was Mercedes Siegle-Gaither with a time of 4:03:45.

Venerable past champion Marge Hickman came through the aid station with a time of 5:47:29 in 740th place overall, followed by her only competition in her age group race of Jacqueline Pomeroy (age 70) 5:53:48.

Half Pipe 29.3 miles 7:30 cutoff

First into Half Pipe seemed to be Reid Burrows in 3:51:46. But there was no split for JP Giblin.

Next to arrive was Matthew Vira 3:54:53, Rob Krar 4:00:21, Isaac Frank 4:02:20, Spyridon Logothetis 4:04:44 and further back was marvelous Marvin Sandoval in 4:25:47 28th place.

The women's race was quite a battle with Jacquie Mannhard arriving first in 4:21:13 and 24th overall. Lucie Hanes followed in 4:35:30 43rd, Colleen Noonan 4:36:11 44th, Kate LeVasseur 4:36:21 45th. Further behind was Cecelia Williams 4:50:09 71st and Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 4:53:53 77th.

Marge Hickman was still in the race with a time of 6:57:36, good for 718th overall and followed by her other age group runner Jacqueline Pomeroy in 7:15:48.

There were 750 runners remaining in the race at this point.

Jason Miller 7:31:28 missed the cutoff once again, as he did at Outward Bound. However, he was allowed to continue in the race.

Twin Lakes Out 37.9 miles 9:30 hours is the cutoff

First into Twin Lakes aid station was Matthew Vira 5:21:44 (8:29/mile) with Reid Burrows right behind him in 5:21:48

(interesting since the video shows Vira crossing at the same time as Matthew). Chip timing is interesting...

Third place was taken by JP Giblin 5:33:01 followed by Rob Krar 5:33:18, Ry Webb 5:41:12, Isaac Frank 5:42:45, Luke Paulson 5:42:54 and Spyridon Logothetis 5:44:34. Marvelous Marvin Sandoval came through in 6:30:21 46th overall.

The women were still running strong and challenging each other with first place going to Jacquie Mannhard 6:05:07 24th overall (9:38/mile) followed by Colleen Noonan 6:19:24 32nd, Lucie Hanes 6:25:50 41st, Kate LeVasseur 6:27:26 42nd, Alexi Pappas 6:50:07 77th, Lindsey Knast 6:50:25 80th, Emily Wanless 6:50:40, Cecilia Williams 6:51:44 and Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 6:52:53 87th overall.

Further back was Sara West-Hoover in 8:44:41 541 overall but then she dropped out of the race.

Venerable Marge Hickman made it to Twin Lakes five minutes **OVER** the cutoff time in 9:35:23 and 706th place overall. Marge was out of the race since she missed the extremely difficult cutoff time now in place at Twin Lakes.

Marge said “she wouldn’t be able to make it over Hope Pass if she wanted to. She was too hot and ran out of water.”

703 runners were still in the race before the cutoff time.

Paige Powell (F) missed the cutoff with a time of 9:30:17 but was allowed to continue after an incredible sprint across the timing mat. The video was posed on the internet and shows her true Leadville ultrarunner spirit. Unfortunately, she would become a DNF shortly after this.

Hope Pass Out 43.5 miles 12 hours – Killer cutoff for lots of runners!

First at the Hopeless Aid Station was Matthew Vira 6:57:23, followed by JP Gilpin 7:05:36, Reid Burrows 7:09:20, Rob Krar 7:15:54 and Luke Paulson 7:17:17.

Further back was Spyridon Logothetis 7:48:39 19th, Marvin Sandoval 8:30:56 46th, Christian Finkbeiner 9:24:54 114th.

Even further back was Jim Newell (perennial favorite and 69 year old runner from Leadville) with a time of 12:03:00 but missed cutoff while in 554th place overall.

Para-athlete extraordinaire, Matthew Matese, came through in a blazing time of 10:48:46 but also became a DNF later in the race.

On the women's side, first into the Hopeless Aid Station was Jacquie Mannhard in 7:52:49, good for 22nd place overall. Next was Coleen Noonan 8:12:08 32nd, Lucie Hanes 8:25:53 42nd, Kate LeVasseur 8:29:22 45th, Alexi Pappas 8:55:26 73rd, Addy Rastall 9:01:36 78th, Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 9:19:29 108th and followed closely by Emma Wood 9:19:59 109th overall.

550 runners remained in the race, running out and upward from Hopeless Aid Station. A total of 74 runners missed the cutoff at this aid station.

Winfield 50 miles 14 hours – Half Way Point

The leader into Winfield was Matthew Vira with an excellent time of 8:00:51 (9:37/mile). However, Matthew dropped out at this point.

What? Leading the race and dropped out? How is that possible? Well, that was clearly explained.

Matthew developed Rhabdomyolysis. That is an extremely serious condition where the breakdown of muscle tissue leads to the release of muscle fiber contents into the blood. Those substances are harmful to the kidney and often cause kidney damage. This is NOT something to run through and continue with a race, risking future health. Matthew made a very wise decision not to continue with his race.

The temperature was 76 degrees F at Winfield, on this hot race day, so that may have contributed to Matthew's serious medical issue.

Following Matthew into Winfield was JP Giblin 8:07:1, Reid Burrows 8:17:49, Scott Traer 8:20:52, Luke Paulson 8:23:33, Rob Krar 8:30:13

Rob Krar also dropped out of the race at Winfield. For those who might not know, in 2014 Rob Krar was one of the best ultrarunners in the U.S., having won Western States, Leadville, and Run Rabbit Run within a 10-week span. Krar won Western States again in 2015 and Leadville again in 2018, but this year he was competing in—and also leading—the Lead Challenge.

Next into Winfield was Spyridon Logothetis 9:04:18 20th, Marvin Sandoval 9:53:26 46th, Wesley Sandoval 11:53:55 199th, Christian Finkbeiner 11:01:24 111th.

In case you were wondering how Dream Chaser Rodrigo Jimenez was progressing, having started the race 2 hours 30 minutes AFTER all runners already streaked out of downtown Leadville, he came through in a time of 10:01:25 (his elapsed time).

For the women, Jacquie Mannhard 9:10:50, 22nd overall with an 11:01 min/mile pace was in the lead.

A bit further back was Colleen Noonan 9:33:22 33rd, Lucie Hanes 9:41:42 38th, Kate LeVasseur 9:44:06 41st, Alexi Pappas 10:21:37 64th, Carrie Stafford 10:28:37 71st and Mercedes Siegle-Gaither (Salida) 11:00:53 110th.

534 runners were still in the race at the Winfield turn around point, with Brian Hill in last place at Winfield with a time of 13:59:38, just beating the cutoff time of 14 hours. We'll see if he is able to finish the race by cutting it so close – stay tuned.

Hope Pass Inbound 56.5 miles no cutoff

Turning around and continuing past Winfield takes every ounce of effort your mind and body has remaining. Another climb up and over Hope Pass is what lies ahead. Brutal is an understatement when describing the extreme pain and agony every runner experiences on this section of the Leadville trail.

First over the pass and into the aid station was JP Giblin 9:38:41 (10:15/mile) followed in second place by Scott Traer 10:01:21 and close behind was Luke Paulson 10:03:19.

A bit further back was Reid Burrows 10:18:05, Buck Blankenship 10:36:43, Ry Webb 10:38:35 (who came all the way from the UK to run the race), Spyridon, Logothetis 11:07:13 18th, Marvin Sandoval 11:53:58 33rd, previous Leadville champion Duncan Callahan 11:44:44 28th and Christian Finkbeiner 13:27:52 98th overall.

A word about Duncan Callahan. Duncan ran 17:43 in 2010 to become the 2010 Leadville Trail 100 mile champion. Duncan obviously knows the course well, albeit a bit older and wiser these days.

Jacquie Mannhard for the women ran an excellent time of 11:03:21, 17th overall (11:44 min/mile pace) followed by Lucie Hanes 11:46:26 30th, Colleen Noonan 12:01:03 40th, Kate LeVasseur 12:04:51 42nd, Carrie Stafford 12:36:03 59th, Alexi Pappas 12:46:49,

Lindsey Knast 12:48:23, Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 13:57:11 135th, Amy Shertzer 13:58:13 137th and Summer Frazier in a time of 13:58:17 in 138th place overall.

Jacquie was definitely lengthening her lead and putting the hammer down on her competitors.

Twin Lakes Inbound 62 miles 18:00 hours

Running strongly back to Twin Lakes and in first place was JP Giblin 10:34:48 (10:09/mile). In second place was Scott Traer 10:54:43 without a pacer, Reid Burrows 11:22:20, Buck Blankenship 11:38:17, Corey Kallembach 11:40:35, Ry Webb 11:43:34, Spyridon Logothetis 12:32:25 19th, Marvin Sandoval 13:19:57 31st, followed by Duncan Callahan 13:24:10 35th place.

Jacquie Mannhard had the women's race well in hand with a time of 12:24:55 17th (11:55/mile). Second place and fifty minutes behind at this point was Lucie Hanes 13:14:50 28th, Colleen Noonan 13:31:57 37th, Kate LeVasseur 13:49:19 49th, Carrie Stafford 13:51:58 50th, Alexi Pappas 14:25:48 68th, Lindsey Knast 14:28:30 73rd, Emma Wood 14:28:37 74th followed by Madeline Wighardt 14:31:17 78th place overall.

425 runners remained in the race at Twin Lakes Inbound.

The last runner into Twin Lakes was Michael McLaughlin 17:59:55.

Just so you don't have to wonder, Michael finished as the last place finisher in the race this year!

Half Pipe Inbound 70.3 miles 21:15 hours

Still in first place was JP Giblin 12:03:43 (10:11/mile) but he was slowed slightly as second place Scott Traer 12:21:42 came a bit closer to JP by only a few minutes.

In third place was Luke Paulson 12:38:18, followed by Reid Burrows 12:59:44, Ry Webb 13:17:42, Corey Kallembach 13:29:34, Buck Blankenship 13:38:15, Spyridon Logothetis 14:23:35 17th, Marvin Sandoval 15:19:07 23rd, Duncan Callahan 15:27:53 31th overall.

Commanding the women's race was Jacquie Mannhard 14:18:37 15th overall with a pace of 12:05 /mile.

Following Jacquie was Lucie Hanes 15:23:04 28th, Colleen Noonan 15:37:13 36th, Kate LeVasseur 15:56:56 44rd, Carrie Stafford 15:57:43 45th, Emma Wood 16:45:41 61st, Alexi Pappas 16:48:10 62nd, Lindsey Knast 16:49:21 63rd, Emily Wanless 16:55:00 66th and Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 18:10:52 117th overall.

388 runners were still in the race after Half Pipe.

Outward Inbound 76.9 miles 23 hours

Running strong in first place was JP Giblin 12:52:34 (10:03/mile). Scott Traer at 13:12:36 wasn't gaining on JP any longer but losing two minutes to the leader. In third place was Luke Paulson 13:30:29, Reid Burrows 14:03:09, Ry Webb 14:12:27, Corey Kallembach 14:30:05, Buck Blankenship 14:49:06 10th, Marvin Sandoval 16:28:46 22nd and Dream Chaser Rodrigo Jimenez's split was 16:27:58 21st place overall.

Lengthening her insurmountable lead for the women was Jacquie Mannhard with a time of 15:20:51 15th overall at an overall pace of 11:58/mile.

Firmly in second place was Lucie Hanes 16:47:43 28th followed by Colleen Noonan 16:52:27 32nd, Kate LeVasseur 17:14:36 44th, Carrie Stafford 17:19:37 48th, Emma Wood 18:04:07 69th, Emily Wanless 18:09:11 71st, Lindsey Knast 18:22:03 74th, Alexi Pappas 18:25:12 76th, Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 19:35:17 120th and Emma Paras 19:35:19 121st overall.

There were 389 runners still in the race.

May Queen Inbound 87.4 miles 27:45 hours

Ahh the sprint for the finish line, so to speak.

Leading the men was JP Giblin 14:57:45 (10:13/mile) followed by Scott Traer 15:31:01, Luke Paulson 15:37:36, Ry Webb 16:25:22, Reid Burrows 16:54:38, Paul Terranova 17:04:26, Spyridon Logothetis 18:28:55 15th, Marvin Sandoval 19:25:12 24th, Duncan Callahan 20:02:13 33rd, Wesley Sandoval 22:08:55 86th and Christian Finkbeiner 22:34:33 93rd overall.

Dream Chaser Rodrigo Jimenez's finishing time was 19:19:17, 22nd place overall.

Leading the women's race by nearly two hours was Jacquie Mannhard with a split time of 18:08:22 13th place overall.

Behind Jacquie in second place for the women was Lucie Hanes 20:00:14 31st, Colleen Noonan 20:05:58 35th, Carrie Stafford 20:27:27 47th, Kate LeVasseur 20:47:33 55th, Madelin Wighardt 20:51:49 57th, Emily Wanless 21:20:18 68th, Emma Wood 21:31:39 74th, Lindsey Knast 22:05:14 85th, Emma Paras 23:25:59 121st, Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 23:47:45 136th and Alexi Pappas with no time split.

370 runners were still in the race after the final desperation aid station of May Queen.

The last runner in/out of May Queen Inbound was William Dutcher in 26:59:20, who ultimately was a DNF for the race.

Michael McLaughlin was #369 in 26:37:25 and did finish the race.

Finish 100 miles 30:00 hours

The men's champion for the 2023 Leadville Trail 100 Mile trail race and 40th anniversary race was JP Giblin with a time of 17:07:25 (10:16/mile) in unseasonably hot weather for Leadville.

As noted earlier, JP is not new to the Leadville Trail 100 Mile race. He first finished the race in 2012 with a time of 24:02. Then in 2022, JP finished the race in 18:07:50, good enough for 2nd place overall. This year, JP became the 2023 Leadville Trail 100 Mile champion. The 29-year-old, also finished 18th at Western States in June as well as second at Bandera 100K in January.

Second place was awarded to Luke Paulson in a time of 17:47:55. Luke Paulson at, 31 years of age, won the Yamacraw 50K in Kentucky in May and was 40 minutes and 30 seconds behind the new champion.

Third place went to Scott Traer in 17:54:12 and never ran with a pacer during the race. Scott and was passed by Luke Paulson during the final section from May Queen to the finish line. The 42-year-old won the Crown King Scramble 50K in May and finished 15th at Western States in June. He is a previous winner of the Javelina Jundred, the Hennepin Hundred and the Vermont 100.

Fourth place went to Ry Webb 18:38:13, Fifth place was Patrick Cade 19:34:54, Sixth place Paul Terranova 19:43:01, Seventh place Corey Kallembach 19:53:18 Eight place Reid Burrows 20:12:34, Ninth place was Daniel Metzger 20:31:50 and rounding out the top Ten places was Sean Bowman 20:40:27.

Spyridon Logothetis from Greece ran 21:21:55 14th place, Marvin Sandoval 22:27:06 24th, Duncan Callahan 22:55:56 32nd, Dream Chaser Rodrigo Jimenez 23:12:08 34th, Wesley Sandoval 25:25:27 83rd, Christian Finkbeiner 26:17:12 91th and Eric Pence 29:55:07 358th place overall.

Eric Pence was three minutes under the cutoff at Twin Lakes Inbound and May Queen Inbound yet still managed to finish his 28th Leadville Trail 100 Mile race, with less than 5 minutes to spare. That is determination at its finest.

Bill Finkbeiner's race record of 30 Leadville Trail 100 Mile finishes might still be untouchable.

Eric Pence now has 28 finishes, but given his decreasing speed on the course (29:55:07 this year) it seems unlikely Eric will break Bill Finkbeiner's record. Time will tell.

The 2023 Leadville Trail 100 Mile race Women's Champion was Jacquie Mannhar with a time of 21:24:55 (12:51/mile), good for 15th place overall in an unseasonably hot race in Leadville, Colorado.

Jacquie Mannhar is a Boulder, Colorado based runner who is at home in the Colorado mountains having won the Kessel Run Ultra (60KM) in November, 2022. Although Jacquie's winning time this year was the slowest women's time since 2010, she still won the race by one hour 52 minutes and 56 seconds over the second-place women's finisher. Unseasonably warm conditions for the race severely affected the winning times.

Second place for the women went to Lucie Hanes 23:16:51 37nd, Third place was Madeline Wighardt 23:32:57 42nd, Fourth place went to Colleen Noonan 23:33:57 44rd, Fifth place was Carrie Stafford 23:48:50 48th, sixth place went to Kate LeVasseur 24:10:10 56th, in Seventh place was Emily Wanless 24:35:45 66th, Eight place Summer Frazier 24:39:15 68th, Nineth place Emma Wood 24:50:20 73rd and in Tenth place for the women was Cecelia Williams 25:40:57 85th.

Other runners included Kristina Chang 25:49:22 88th, Lindsey Knast 25:57:21 90th, Emma Paras 27:11:15 118th, Alexi Pappas 27:47:14 150th and Mercedes Siegle-Gaither 28:58:52 239th place overall.

Junko Kazukawa captured her 9th finish in a time of 28:30:18, 190th place overall and 1st in her 60-year-old age group. Junko now holds the fastest time for a 60 year old female runner.

Last place finisher overall was Michael McLaughlin in 29:56:43 (He was the last runner into Twin Lakes Inbound with a time of 17:59:55).

William Dutcher, last place runner at May Queen Inbound, was a DNF.

Dream Chaser Rodrigo Jimenez left it all out there. He battled significant pain starting at May Queen Outbound, but never stopped pushing. He passed 740 runners and raised over \$133,000 for the Leadville/Lake County community. His finish time was 23:12:08, good for 34th place overall. This was Rodrigo's 9th Leadville Trail 100 Mile finish.

Finally, Brian Hill who was in last place at Winfield with a time of 13:59:38 was a DNF after Winfield.

Final Finishing Results and Belt Buckle Statistics:

- 80 runners ran under 25 hours
 - 9 females
 - 71 males
- 362 total runners finished the race (out of 815 starters in the race)
- Finishing percentage was 44%
 - Men 291/631 (46% finishing percentage)
 - Women 69/176 (39% finishing percentage)


The Lead Challenge winners this year were Corey Kallembach with a time of 36:44:21 and Jolene Sandoval with a time of 51:48:19. This challenge consisted of five trail running and MTB events, covering 282.4 miles, all at 10,000+ feet of Rocky Mountain elevation.

The Leadman and Leadwoman course records (now called the Lead Challenge) are held by:


- Wesley Sandoval 35:54:55 (2016) – Male
- Stephanie Wurtz 43:18:15 (2016) - Female

Miscellaneous Race Notes:

The original Leadville family lost a great one this year. **Cliff Davies**, Eight-time finisher with a best time of 24:07:03 passed away on March 21, 2023 at the age of 88 in Brampton, Ontario, Canada. Cliff entered but DNF'd the very first edition of the race, in 1983. He became lost, high on the slopes of Hope Pass and missed the cutoff at Twin Lakes Inbound. Cliff and his wife Mollie were always fun loving and happy, spending summers in Leadville while volunteering for race support. At the pre-race dinner at the 6th Street Gym, there was always a huge birthday cake to celebrate Mollie's birthday. Mollie preceded Cliff and passed away of Parkinson's Disease.



Keith Stegall, who brought tremendous media exposure to the Leadville Trail 100 Mile Trail Race with his documentaries filmed of the race, died on July 21, 2023. Keith shot the original Leadville Trail 100 movies in the 1990's and put on them on VHS tapes. Keith (Warren Keith Stegall II) was a teacher at Lake County High School in Leadville for 32 years, a great person and tremendous Leadville Trail 100 supporter as well as an excellent filmmaker.



Race Notes

- **Camille Herron** was committed to run this year. "However, my body needed a chill pill in July to get healthy and back to feeling good. Vacationing in Oregon was amazing".
- **Eric Buckley**, who finished his race in 2023 (27:55:35), even wrote a song he performed named 'The Leadville Song'. Most of his songs are about races, so he keeps it simple. But if you think "Two Miles High" is catchier, he's fine with that too. The song was posted on the Leadville 100 Run Participants Facebook page, September 2, 2023.

- **Ray Churgovich** was a DNF at May Queen in 2022 and didn't come back this year. He believes 2024 will be his redemption year. Ray goes on to say, "The sting of defeat runs deep. Make no mistake, you have been humbled by a DNF at Leadville."
- A back-of-the-packer who didn't make the Twin Lakes Outbound cutoff time, passed a LOT of people running out of water and puking on the side of the mountain because they really needed the Elbert/Pipeline hydration stop to be better. It also seems Pipeline aid station had only two people manning the aid station with limited supplies.
- At the Elbert water stop, only water seemed available to the runners.
- The Hopeless Aid Station Outbound also ran out of water. Perhaps a few water purifiers could be used next year to take more water from the stream near the aid station?

Marge Hickman's Race Report

"I headed off to Colorado near the end of May for a running club (Roxborough) Annual Banquet with my good friend, Theresa Daus-Weber. Marshall Ulrich was the guest speaker who is a great and long-time friend of ours. He is an amazing athlete who does "Hard Things." The evening was wonderful and fun-filled with Club members being recognized for their running accomplishments. The dinner and time spent visiting with running buddies I had not seen in a long time and making new friends was so fun! Thanks to Wayne Pallas, President of the Club, and others for such a successful event.

June arrived with my training schedule in full swing. My husband, Michael, drove our RV out to CO and joined me. We boondocked below Turquoise Lake which had beautiful Mt. Elbert and Mt. Massive mountain views. It was also the perfect location for running the course. We were lucky to not be caught by the Forest Service for over-staying the 14-day camping limit. After almost two months, we were told to move on, but the ranger allowed us to stay through the Silver Rush 50 Mile race weekend, whew!

July, I had two races. The first was the Vail Hill Climb which ran from Vail Village up the snowcat road to the top (7.8 mi.). I had a solid run and was able to place 1st in my age group and won a free pair of Dynafit trail shoes. My second race was the Silver Rush 50 which

starts at the bottom of the Dutch Henry ski hill. Now that is one way to spread the runners out from the “get go!” A cool, but warm enough early morning start, I was puffing up the steep hill but felt strong, in pursuit of the 70+ (73) A.G. and win as well as a gold coin for entry in the 2024 LT100.

On the return, about mile 40ish, I got a slight hamstring/calf cramp in my left leg. I gingerly continued running trying to keep it from getting worse with some massage. Nearing the finish about 4 miles out and knowing I had a cushion, I power hiked and ran it in. I so wanted to be under 13 hours but was close enough. My 13:04 time was good enough to win my age group and being the only woman to finish.

It was a great day for me except for Ken not handing me the gold coin, but passing it off to a Life Time staffer to do it. Leaving the podium, I extended my hand for Ken to shake, but instead he turned angry, gave me an ugly face of hate, and said “*Not a chance!*” His inexcusable behavior continues to show his (and Merilee’s) true colors of dislike for me and Steve for writing our book. Everyone at the awards ceremony saw what he did to me. This tells me that Ken and Merilee will NEVER accept the fact that they are NOT the founders nor race directors of Jim Butera’s original dream of starting the Leadville Trail 100, the Race Across the Sky. That incident aside, the race made me even more confident that I would have an awesome finish for my 15th and final LT100 race.

August arrived quickly and by mid-month my crew, pacers, and best friends (including Steve Siguaw, co-author of our book, “*Leadville Trail 100, the History of the Race*”) arrived on the scene for Team Pixie. (Theresa Daus-Weber, Jeff and Deb Spencer, Laurie and Jeff Gallegos and Lisa Dowdney). And, of course, my husband, Michael who took everything in stride. I could not run ultras without him. He is the best crew chief! What fun we had together, laughing, jokes, lots of eating and photos we had. I love you all! My final ten days of training, taper and rest began. Nerves, anxiety and too much thinking and worrying rolled in my head, but also feeling like I was coming down with a slight cold, sore throat, and congestion. Good ole *NyQuil* to the rescue for a good night’s sleep and feeling better in the morning.

However, a couple of days before the race day were hectic. I had a book signing at “Two Dog Travel” from 4 to 6, but it lasted until

7:30 p.m. It was a great success but I was pooped. The next day, Friday, was the pre-race meeting and packet pick-up. I was not feeling 100%. No whining Marge, JUST DO IT!

The loud blast of the gun goes off for the start of the 40th Anniversary of the LT100. Wow! I still get chills when I think about it. The 4 a.m. start was warm enough that I ran in shorts which I never do but it helped to save time so I would not have to take off my pant leg bottoms at May Queen. My crew had my water bottles ready, GU packets, food baggies with fig bars, Honey Stinger pieces, cantaloupe, GU gummies, and Pay Day candy bar pieces!

I felt good and thought I was running a good pace until running along the asphalt road from Powerline to Outward Bound (OB) aid station. My friend, Rebecca, ran up to me and said that I had 16 minutes to make the cutoff there. What?? Apparently, the cutoff time was 30 minutes less than what I thought. Run Marge Run, and run I did! I gained time from OB to Pipeline and topped off my water. The hot sun and temp (75+ degrees) was brutal and my legs were on fire.

Then, the left leg cramps started. Oh no! I had purchased some “Splish” at the race Expo which worked on my muscle cramps, but did not last long enough. I slowed down to the point that when I got to Twin Lakes I missed the cut off by 5 minutes. Heartbreaking to say the least. I was so disappointed and could not believe it! What just happened...? Sad but true. As “Cutoff Cliff” (Davies) used to say when he cut your wristband off; *“You’ll live to fight another day.”*

After licking my wounds, Michael and I went to the finish line and awards ceremony Sunday morning. I loved seeing friends and runners finishing and running up the red carpet. It made me feel happy as I tried to put my race behind me. A friend asked me if I saw my name (and Jim Howards) on a large poster-board along the Boulevard. No, I did not see it. So, afterwards, Michael and I drove down the Boulevard to see the 39 years of past champions’ names on poster-boards. How very wonderful and thoughtful of Life Time Fitness to recognize all past champions. It made me cry to see them all and recall great memories of 39 years of the LT100.

Two days later, I really felt ill. I took a Covid home kit test and was positive for Covid. Go figure and just my luck! So, now the question is do I enter the LT100 in 2024?

Facing reality, I know in my heart and gut that this was my last Leadville 100. However, having a gold coin for next year, you just never know. And, women are allowed to change their minds!

My future includes more adventures, shorter races, biking, weights, Pilates, fun, laughter, dancing, singing, and whatever strikes my fancy! And, of course, training, running and racing!

Also, to continue encouraging, inspiring and supporting younger people of all ages to try to “*Do Hard Things*” that challenge them. Run on!”



A fantastic story from Joe Rummler, 2021 Leadville finisher in 29:12:09:

“I’ve been to a place that is not on the map, where time and space stretch out until they become meaningless.

Pain and fear creep up and pounce in wave after wave.

Finally, the pain just becomes a reminder that this is all real. What became important was people.

Aid station volunteers and people cheering on roadsides were sources of hope and love and energy beyond any words.

Other runners were comrades in arms, all suffering, none complaining, all giving a word of encouragement even when we could barely get the words out.

We had sun, sleet, wind, hail, and a little snow late at night. I might post some time about the mechanics of the race, but that doesn't feel important now.

Nadya (Nadezda Dhadiala, 5-time non-finisher at Leadville) asked if it changed my character?

I think that is a question for me to ask others later. But I can say that I learned what I had hoped to learn: that pain and fear are distractions that have no real power to interfere with my goals.

And I got an unexpected lesson: People are really everything. My crew, my partner, the random strangers cheering, my friends reading this post..."

Two former NFL players ran the race in 2023 (New York Times; 8/29/2023 article by Anna Katherine Clemmons):

David Vobora, 37 and Nate Boyer 42

"Both men were trying to become the first former N.F.L. team members to finish the punishing 100-mile race before the 30-hour cutoff.

After almost 17 hours on the course, Vobora trudged back into Twin Lakes. On Hope Pass, he hadn't stopped vomiting for three hours. He had experienced intense cramping. A medical official had recommended that he drop out, and he relented.

As he rode the shuttle down the mountain, he leaned his head against the window and bawled.

After Vobora's N.F.L. career, he founded the Adaptive Training Foundation in Dallas, which provides free training and community to wounded, ill and injured military veterans and civilians.

He became interested in running Leadville after pacing a friend for 18 miles in 2021.

Boyer finished the race in 24 hours 31 minutes 7 seconds. The announcer called his name out to the nearly empty stands. Boyer was the 57th male finisher and the 63rd finisher overall.

Boyer, a former U.S. Army Green Beret who went on to play football at the University of Texas, was an undrafted free agent who played long snapper in preseason games for Seattle in 2015.

Boyer is a filmmaker and a co-founder of Merging Vets and Players, a nonprofit organization that helps combat veterans and former professional athletes make transitions to new lives. He also

hosts the Discovery Channel show “Survive the Raft,” in which contestants work together on a raft to complete challenges.

Vobora was the last pick in the 2008 N.F.L. draft, earning the annual title “Mr. Irrelevant.” He worked his way up to starting linebacker for the Rams and then the Seahawks during a four-year career.”

Rules, etc. from The Official Runners Handbook for 2023⁵

To earn the coveted silver and gold belt buckle at the Leadville Trail 100, you must finish the race in under 30 hours for the small buckle and under 25 hours for the big buckle.

All buckle times are based on individual runner chip times, as they have been in years past. See the definition of chip time vs. gun time below.

- 25-hour cutoff time = BIG BUCKLE
- 30-hour cutoff time = SMALL BUCKLE and official finisher

Chip Time – your time starts when you cross the timing mat at the start, and ends when you cross the timing mat when you finish – accounting for all elapsed time on the course.

Gun Time – your time starts when the race starts

Reminder – Chip time will be used to determine your belt buckle eligibility and there will be no changes to those times. Gun time will be used for course cutoffs.

There are 12 aid stations along the course, 10 completely stocked aid stations and 2 hydration-only (Coke & Water) stations:
